Selectmen's Report

It's hard to believe another year has passed already. Many things occurred in FY2023.

First off, we hired Loretta Powers as Town Administrator in July of 2022.

The Town Office purchased a Pitney Bowes mail machine cutting down on their trips to the post office and helping get certified mailings out quicker. They also had heat pumps installed which eliminates the need for window air conditioners.

The Grange Hall had to have a new septic installed as well as a new generator as the motor had seized.

There was much discussion around Short Term Rentals as it was a popular topic and research was done including how other towns are handling it. At this time no further action is being taken due to the extent and time required to monitor/permit this.

Several liquor licenses were renewed over the year to the multiple establishments over on the Sunday River side of the mountain.

The church was a hot topic with it needing work and what would be required to make it safe, get a septic and possibly move it away from the road. When put to vote, the townspeople decided to put it up for sale. Ultimately it sold to a couple from Florida who appreciate the beauty of it and plan to restore it as they have other landmarks.

CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER REPORT Town of Newry 2023

Hello Newry citizens and property owners.

The beauty of this small town has proven to be its people. People with tractors, people with chain saws, people with knowledge of 4x4 trails that would get folks home, people with giant excavators, people with a smile and a hug, people with trucks for gas and food runs, people that are your neighbors, friends and family.

From our May heavy rains and flooding damages to the flooding and roads washed away from the December 18, 2023 storm, the people have proven their resilience and neighborly thoughtfulness. Cars, roads, firewood, culverts, a foundation, and an entire home washed away. But we were all checking on one another, still smiling through the shock and celebrating the holidays the best we could. Thank you all for your patience, hard work, and grit.

Spring will bring more road work than we typically do to repair the damages and I'm sure we'll continue with this building boom.

Now the official business.

There were 47 building permits issued – 23 Single Family homes and a new condo/townhouse structure. There was a new lift installed on Merrill Hill and Barker Lift was replaced. Total permit fees equaling \$29,741.57

Newry has been mandated by the State since 2019 to follow the Maine Uniform Building and Energy Codes. Recently these codes were updated to the 2015 ICC codes.

The current plumbing code is the 2021 'IAPMO' Uniform Plumbing Code.

Electrical permits are handled through the State.

Some points to remember:

- Every structure, renovation or addition needs a permit in Newry.
- Building plans and cross sections are required for structures over 600 sq ft and one- or two-family dwelling units, including Tiny Homes.
- ❖ Only two unregistered cars are allowed on your property per State law.

2023 Planning Board Report

The Planning Board handled many issues during 2023, the following are some of the highlights.

The Planning Board spent many evenings working very diligently updating the UDRO (United Development Review Ordinance). Many of the updates were changing words and terms that were either not quite correct or conflicting with other terms within the UDRO. We added definitions to the glossary in order to clear up terms within the texts of the UDRO.

We did not make substantial changes to the UDRO but we tried to make it easier to understand and clearer in its intent.

We worked on and eventually approved a new ski lift and a replacement ski lift at the ski area. A new golf cart building was approved for the golf course.

There were several meetings concerned with changes within subdivisions. There were no new subdivisions proposed this last year.

It does not sound like we did very much but we work very hard to try to see that the development that happens in the town occurs within the perimeters of the ordinances of the town. There are many pages in these ordinances, we as members of the planning board can not be for nor against any project that comes before us, we can only look at the merits of the project as to how they adhere to the ordinances. When we make a decision it has to be based upon what is written within the ordinances, if it is not written in the ordinance then the decision will not stand up to scrutiny.

The time has come to update the town's comprehensive plan. Many comprehensive plans are very good inventories of what is in the town but fall short on a good vision of what possibly the town might become. We can not fix the mistakes of our past but we can try to not repeat mistakes. The time has come to dream of the future of our town and how we may get there.



As I step into my Sixth year as Sheriff, I reflect with immense pride on the achievements of our agency across the county. The momentum we have going into the New Year is a testament to the dedicated team of men and women who serve Oxford County with unwavering pride. Their commitment to our mission, rooted in professionalism, integrity, and leadership, is the driving force propelling our agency forward.

In previous years, I've highlighted the escalating volume and complexity of our calls to service. Notably, the surge in responses to mental health concerns since 2019 underscores the pressing need for increased state funding for community services and sheriff's departments statewide. This is crucial to ensuring the safety of individuals in need and those around them.

Our commitment to addressing the opioid epidemic in Oxford County persists through our collaboration with local organizations, notably the Western Maine Addiction Recovery Initiative. We actively refer eligible individuals to Project Save ME as part of our ongoing efforts. This police-assisted initiative aims to bridge individuals affected by substance use disorder with dedicated recovery coaches, advocates, and various treatment services, providing crucial support on their journey to recovery.

Over the summer, deputies participated in Camp P.O.S.T.C.A.R.D (Police Officers Striving To Create And Reinforce Dreams). This camp provides children with a week filled with activities, including swimming, boating, hiking, crafts, and campfires. As the week unfolds, the kids discover that their camp counselors and leaders are police officers and sheriff's deputies from across Maine. This initiative underscores that for our deputies, being visible and present in our communities extends beyond their call of duty; they also serve as leaders, fostering positive connections with the next generation.

With that in mind, on behalf of our deputies, correctional officers, and support staff I want to thank our community for the ongoing support we have received. Whether through letters, social media, or public acknowledgments, your backing resonates throughout our agency.

We have great opportunities ahead of us, and I look forward to the work we will accomplish in the coming year. If you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact our office at 207-743-9554.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share an update on issues important to Maine and America.

One of my priorities for 2023 has been to improve the appropriations process in Congress – the way it decides how to spend taxpayer money. I took over as the Vice Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee last year. Along with Chair Patty Murray, we decided the best change we could make was not to do something new. Instead, it was to do something old – that is, go back to the regular and transparent committee process that we used to have.

Part of restoring this process included holding 50 public Committee hearings, which allowed for input from senators on both sides of the aisle. As a result, for the first time in five years, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed all twelve of its funding bills on time. This was done with strong bipartisan support. In fact, seven of them passed unanimously.

Now, we need to work with the House of Representatives to pass these twelve bills and turn them into laws.

These bills contain funding for a wide range of Maine priorities, including support for the workforce at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, our lobster industry, infrastructure improvements, affordable housing, biomedical research, veterans, and heating assistance programs like LIHEAP. These bills also contain nearly \$590 million in Congressionally Directed Spending for 231 projects throughout the State of Maine. These projects would help promote job creation, expand access to health care, and improve public safety, infrastructure, and important resources in communities across all 16 counties of our state. I will continue to work to get these bills signed into law in the new year.

On October 25, the horrific mass shooting in Lewiston claimed the lives of 18 Mainers and injured 13 others. In response, I led Maine's Congressional Delegation in requesting an independent investigation by the U.S. Army Inspector General into the events leading up to the shooting. On December 15, the Under Secretary of the Army wrote to inform me that such an investigation will take place, and the Army Inspector General has instructed her team to immediately begin preparing to conduct this investigation. While nothing can undo the events of October 25, I will continue to work to understand what happened and what could have been done differently, and to find answers for the victims, survivors, and their families.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,855th consecutive roll call vote.

As we look ahead to 2024, I remain committed to addressing the concerns of Maine families and communities. If you need assistance or wish to share your thoughts, please do not hesitate to reach out to one of my six state offices.

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

Maine's heritage industries are the backbone of our state's economy. That is why one of the first bills I introduced in this Congress was the Northeast Fisheries Heritage Protection Act, which would prohibit commercial offshore wind energy development in Lobster Management Area 1 (LMA 1) in the Gulf of Maine. LMA 1 was identified by the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) as a potential commercial offshore wind site. LMA 1 is a critical and highly productive fishing ground for a variety of sea life, including lobster. Prohibiting offshore wind development in LMA 1 would help to avoid conflict with the New England commercial and recreational fishing industries. Additionally, the bill would initiate a federal study on the environmental review processes of any relevant Federal agencies for offshore wind projects in the Gulf of Maine.

I also continue to advocate on behalf of our veterans and those providing care to our former service members. The current pay for VA employees in the Kennebec and Penobscot counties does not reflect the critical services they are providing. As the oldest state in the nation, with the fifth highest veteran population, Mainers rely on the services offered at the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) facilities. That's why recently, Senator Collins, Senator King, Representative Pingree, and I called on the Biden Administration to increase locality pay for VA employees in Kennebec and Penobscot counties. The level of care received is impacted by job vacancies, and the high turnover rate among its healthcare workforce is often the result of pay and compensation issues, which is further exacerbated by the increased cost of living.

Lastly, I'm excited that Mainers are continuing to reap the benefits of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). Recently, millions of dollars in grants have been awarded across the state, including \$35 million through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Culvert Aquatic Organism Passage (AOP) program to conserve spawning and migratory habitats for native fish species in Maine, \$460,000 through the Airport Infrastructure Grant (AIG) program for the Princeton Municipal Airport, Stephen A. Bean Municipal Airport, and Dexter Regional Airport, and nearly \$8 million through the Buses and Bus Facilities Program for Bangor's bus system. These investments are critical to ensuring Maine's infrastructure and will help to ensure Mainers and businesses across Maine are connected.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. Thank you for the opportunity to serve as your State Senator. I am humbled by the trust you have placed in me to be a voice for you, your family, and our community in Augusta. I continue to work tirelessly on your behalf.

The First Regular and First Special Sessions of the 131st Maine State Legislature were notable as there were over 2,600 legislative bill requests and 2,019 of them were officially printed as Legislative Documents (LDs). No legislature this century has had as many LDs printed during its first year.

Promoting policies that empower people to build to a better future for themselves is always the focus of my work; in this era of diminishing personal liberty, restrictive regulations, and soaring costs, commonsense solutions have never been more essential.

We did find success in the Highway Fund. I have heard from many of you regarding the biggest concerns you are facing, including increasing energy costs, child care, education, housing, inflation, child welfare, mental health and substance abuse, workforce development, and community safety, among others. As your State Senator, I will continue to advocate for you in Augusta.

 Furniture and Fixtures (F&F), Trailers (T) and Signs (S). A complete list must be filed to comply with this
 706-A request. Use the form provided or create a comparable substitute to submit your return.
- Trailers –Non-excised trailers are to be reported. If excise tax has been paid on any trailer, it need <u>not</u> be reported. Registered and non-registered trailers that no excise tax was paid must be reported.
- **Do not include** the following on the asset list: Real estate, taxes, building costs, shipping, or handling costs, etc. Only tangible items of personal property should be listed.
- Leased Equipment If you are in possession of leased equipment (e.g. photocopier, postage machine, forklift) list those items separately. Provide the name of the leasing company and lessor's contact information (telephone number, email etc.). Leased equipment will be assessed to the party in possession if we do not have accurate contact information for the party responsible for taxes.

Personal Property Tax Relief

Business owners who pay personal property taxes may be eligible for relief. There are two property tax relief programs that are presently available:

- The Business Equipment Tax Exemption Program (BETE) and
- The Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement Program (BETR).

BETE (exempt) assets should <u>not</u> appear on this filing form. Contact our office or the *Maine Revenue*Services for a BETE application. Your BETR (refund) eligible assets <u>will</u> be reported on this form.

Note: BETE eligibility was expanded in 2018.
